Community Courtvard

This historic building is the only existing example of Mediterranean Baroque Architecture in the City of St. Augustine. Designed by a Flagler era architect, this brick and stucco structure will be restored to continue the legacy of the First Congregation Sons of Israel early congregants.

At the center of the courtyard is a proposed tile mosaic, which will incorporate the greens, blues, and golds that define the interior stained glass. The mosaic will even incorporate glass from the original windows.

Surrounding the courtyard, palms will frame the entry with other shrubs and flowering plants based in scripture as well as the St. Augustine climate and community. Here, the teachings and celebrations within the synagogue can extend out into our surrounding environment.

The Sanctuary houses the historic stained and leaded glass windows, and the Torah scrolls which were brought from Europe to St. Augustine by the early congregants. The heart of our congregation lies in the Sanctuary. Here, the culture of the congregation is maintained, preserved, and celebrated daily. Improvements seek to rehabilitate and restore the vitality of the space. The renovation will include preservation of the woodwork, the refurbishment of the stained glass windows, as well as several other projects to help maintain this symbol of the Jewish community.



Built in 1928 and attached to the back of the Sanctuary, the Max Jaffe Hall was designed to serve as a social hall for First Congregation Sons of Israel. The hall included a kosher kitchen and bathrooms for the congregants. Max Jaffe was a long time lay leader of religious services and educator of the Hebrew school. He served dutifully up to and past his 100th year.

Our goal is to restore this communal area in order to provide adequate function for celebrations within our community. Here wedding receptions, birthdays, and other joyous celebrations could take place.

Descendants of Rabbi Jacob Tarlinsky, the first rabbi of the Congregation, indicated a desire for a reflective, meditative green space as a vital part of the synagogue. When completed this space will be a fitting honor to the early congregants. The prayer garden creates a space for quiet contemplation.

Here, the teachings of the Torah come to life. Barley, olive, and pomegranate trees sway in the breeze as the soft crunching of gravel underfoot creates a serene and peaceful environment for all to experience in their own time. Several etched excerpts from the Pentateuch punctuate the area, giving visitors pause and completing the Prayer Garden.




